Dear Residents of Combs Parish,

This was to have been Councillor Ian Walker's first report but as he's currently unwell I shall be filling in for him.

It's a busy time for the Parish with three big events (the Jubilee Beacon, the Oak's Meadow Medicine Wheel and the joint Village fete) all occurring in short order, hence our one-off extended edition to do them all justice.

The Jubilee Beacon lighting on 2nd June was a great success, attended by some 2-300 people who enjoyed a barbeque and refreshments and a splendid rendition of a specially written song by a choir put together under very short notice beforehand. The event was a fitting testament to the organisational skills of those Parish stalwarts Stuart and Jill Scarff and a sizeable supporting cast. I'm sorry to report that Stuart has decided to step down from the Parish Chair after some 12 years of first class service. The Parish has benefited greatly under his leadership and we are delighted – indeed positively relieved - that he is staying on as a Councillor.

The 10th of May saw us hold a 'double-meeting': first the Annual Parish Meeting and then following on immediately the Council Annual General Meeting. 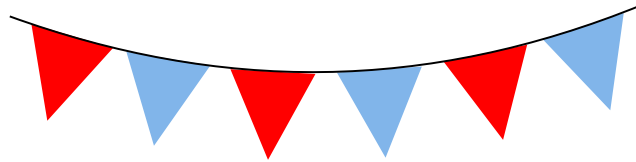

As part of the festival of Suffolk for the Jubilee celebrations, on Monday 23rd May the Festival Torch relay passed through Combs on its 588-mile journey around Suffolk. It started in Brandon on Friday 13th May, visiting 250 towns and villages along the way to the Suffolk Show, finally reaching its destination on Wednesday 1st June where it was a centre-piece for the big Jubilee Pageant at the Showground.

The Festival Torch Relay was the idea of Mark Brennan and the torch was designed by the CEO of Brafe, Andrew Dalby. It has 70 holes to symbolize the Queen's reign and the Festival of Suffolk logo on one side.

The rickshaw started its day in Stowmarket, arriving at St Mary's Church Hall at about 9.35am where Cllr Suzanne Ottewell volunteered to ride in the rickshaw to the corner of Jack's Lane and Park Road, saying it was a great honour and great fun! From there, the relay carried on to Great Finborough, Onehouse and various other towns and villages before finishing the day at Badwell Ash at approx. 7pm.



The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Beacon

On Thursday 2nd June the Parish Beacon in the new cemetery at St Mary's Church Combs was lit at 21:45 along with many others around the country.

A large crowd of several hundred people attended the church grounds to enjoy a BBQ and refreshments in the warm and sunny weather.

The newly formed community choir performed a beautiful rendition of a song especially written for the jubilee from inside the church. Everyone then walked around to the new cemetery to see the beacon being lit by Stuart Scarff, to the sound of the choir singing several songs including the jubilee song "A Song for the Commonwealth" and the National Anthem.

Many thanks to all those involved in organising the event including Jill Scarff and team for assembling the choir and arranging all the rehearsals.

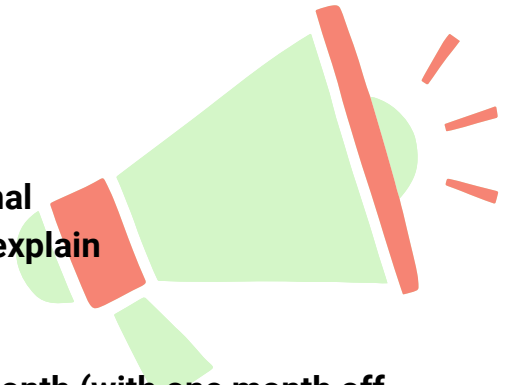

Councillor Recruitment

We have vacancies for two additional councillors.

It's a responsible and fulfilling position which carries an opportunity to help shape the Parish in light of the external demands placed on it. We thought it might be helpful to explain what that means in practical terms.



We schedule meetings for the second Monday of each month (with one month off in the summer). These are held at Battsford and Combs Cricket Club at 7:30pm and we generally finish at 9:00-9:30. The 'meat' of the meeting lies in reviewing and commenting on building planning applications after which we record the extent to which we support them (or not . . .). This requires some preparation and we usually set aside 2 or so hours over the preceding week to review records on the Mid-Suffolk planning website as well as other papers and the financial statements provided by our Secretary, Tony Bamber. In addition to that there are other projects we look to – these differ but examples include: support for the Oaks Meadow development; support for the St Mary's church bells refurbishment; upkeep of the cemetery and churchyard; footpaths and walks; roads, traffic and utilities; and organisation of other community activities such as the annual litter pick. Basically you can put in whatever effort you are comfortable with and around other demands.

We'd welcome any expression of interest. No prior experience is necessary and training is provided in the form of webinars – this can be very flexible and spread out to suit you. We'd be particularly open to volunteers from Moats Tye/Little London as our representation is currently concentrated along the Park Road/Battsford Road area.

Mid Suffolk

"I am struggling to stay on top of my household bills; my weekly food shop isn't stretching as far anymore and now my energy bill is going up too. I don't know how I'm going to afford all of these price rises. What can I do to stop my finances spiralling out of control?"

First of all, you are not alone in this and there's support to help you.

It's always worth checking if there are benefits you don't know about that you're eligible for, including support with your energy costs and living costs. On the Citizens Advice website - citizensadvice.org.uk - there's a benefits calculator, advice on how to reduce living costs and information on other ways to increase your income.

There's also emergency support that you may have access to, such as food bank vouchers or fuel vouchers.

If you're struggling to stay on top of bills, it's really important to understand what money you have coming in and going out each month.

Citizens Advice also has a budgeting tool on its website that can help with this.

If you're already behind on bills, prioritise paying your rent or mortgage, plus energy bills and Council Tax first. Not paying these bills has the most serious

consequences. You should speak to the person or company you owe money to, to see if they can help you repay your bills sustainably.

We know that times are incredibly tough but please remember, you don't have to face this alone, so do contact Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk to help you find a way forward.

Did You Know.....



Ipswich Journal 31st March 1804 reports:

Lionel Lee, for a burglary in the dwelling house of Thomas Robinson, of Combs. Before the Judge

left the town, the three first were reprieved, but Lee was left for execution at Ipswich, on Saturday the 14th April. **Ipswich Journal 21st April 1804 reports:** Saturday last Lionel Lee was executed here pursuant to his sentence, in the presence of a vast concourse of spectators

Ipswich Journal 15th March 1828 reports:

Thomas Robinson and George Ely, were charged with having broken into the barn of Mr George Ruffle, of Combs, in the night of January the 28th last, and stolen four bushels of red wheat and a hempen sack. Guilty and sentenced to 12 months imprisonment and hard labour in the County Gaol.

Ipswich Journal reports: (no date could be found)

Chas. Raby charged with stealing a pair of stockings, the property of Francis Battle, of Combs and John Root, charged with receiving the same: the former pleaded guilty. 6 calendar months hard labour-last solitary.

Ipswich Journal 26th July 1834 reports:

John Simpson 22 was indicted for stealing at Stowmarket a hat, the property of Mark Cresswell, of Coddendam. The prosecutor had been sleeping on a table in a publichouse at Stowmarket and when he awoke he found his hat missing. Between five and six in the morning of the robbery he saw his hat in the hands of the constable. The constable who apprehended the prisoner, stated that he took the hat from his hand, he was walking up the street in the direction of Combs. The prosecutor identified the hat. The prisoner said he took up the hat for his own, but he was much in liquor and did not know what he did. The jury returned a verdict of - Guilty he was sentenced to three calendar months imprisonment and hard labour.

Ipswich Journal December 29th 1835 reports:

On the 26th inst. at Coddendam, before the Revds.. Thomas Brown, Richard Etough, D.D., William Colvile and Francis Steward. Edward Robinson of Combs for riding on the shafts of his waggon and driving the same furiously on the turnpike road at Badley: penalty, including costs 12s 6d

Ipswich Journal Tuesday 11th July 1882 reports:

School Act Case - Fredk. Mulley, Combs, was charged with neglecting to send his son to school on the 25th May. Defendant's wife appeared and said the child was sent, but was refused admittance because she did not send the school fee, which he forgot to take. The child had been kept away before on account of having whooping cough. Fined 1s without costs

Orchard Barn News

Volunteers needed – no experience necessary!

We recently held a 'topping out' ceremony for our re-instated 1580s Long House green oak roof! Everyone involved in the build, including some of our funders, gathered to celebrate finishing the raising of the frame. William Clement Smith, the professional timber framer who has worked with volunteers throughout, fixed a bouquet of apple, elm and oak to the apex of the Southern gable and a toast to the house was drunk.



Now we need to close the building in before the Winter and need Volunteers to make shingles (wooden tiles) for the roof and to pack the straw and clay mix into the walls for insulation. This is a deep green, hybrid daub. The materials are home dug and grown within 5 miles of the project. It is mixed with a hoe and applied by hand.
