Dear Residents

And, more prosaically, your Parish Council is also in a period of renewal. Stuart Scarff, Chairman for 10 years and Council stalwart for more than 30, has decided to step down for a well-earned rest. For my part Stuart has provided first-class support to me over my first year as Chair. He has long been an asset to the council and, thereby, to the whole community. I imagine we all know some very intelligent people but perhaps fewer who are also wise: Stuart is as clever and wise as they come.

As it stands the remaining four councillors (Terry Betchley, Suzanne Ottewell, Alan Tomlinson and I) are staying on – the election was uncontested as the parish council quota is seven persons. We would LOVE some company so do please consider joining us – talk to any of us or Tony Bamber if you'd like to find out more. We'd especially like to bolster our team with some younger people and with some representation from the Moats Tye/Little London area. We have the discretion to co-opt councillors at any time.

I want to touch on an annoying issue: the housing development on Bildeston Road and the attendant disruption. As a Parish Council our legal powers are limited but we do wield our 'soft power' as we see fit. We have been busy lobbying both our County and District Councillors, Kay Oakes and John Matthissen, providing them with the evidence to take up the cudgels on our behalf. We are grateful to them both: they've obtained two Stop Notices and putting the development under condition enforcement. We've also compiled and sent a file of the various problems caused to the owner of the development company and received an apology and a stated aim to reduce disruption. We will keep on top of it as best we can.

Finally, weather permitting (!) we'll be holding an informal 'Meet and Greet' on Saturday 24th June at the corner of Park Road and Jack's Lane from 10:00-11:00am. If you're around, do drop by and say hello – we'd love to get to know you, hear your issues, answer your questions and help out as best we can.

Retirement of Councillor Stuart Scarff

After being involved with the parish council for around 30 years, 10 of them as chairman, Stuart has decided to take a well-earned retirement.

Aside from being involved in pretty much everything that has happened in the village, Stuart is a regular sight driving his farm vehicles around the village tending to his fields and crops. There have been many village events, with notable ones in recent years being the annual village fete, whose revival was instigated by Stuart in 2008, when he brought together a committee to work with the gardening club, cubs and scouts, brownies and guides and other local interest groups.

As well as becoming a popular fixture in the village the fete was a great way for local residents to meet up and few who attended could have failed to notice Stuart's helpful presence everywhere from being on a tractor moving bales (and occasionally crushing garden chairs that sneak up) to helping to create the bar and, after the work was over, sampling its produce. What many people may not have appreciated was how much in the way of effort and materials Stuart contributed in order to ensure the fete worked. Other relatively recent events in the village have included:

- the development of a parish plan, which helped to defend the village against speculative development;
- the erection of a commemorative beacon, which was lit for the WW1 commemorations and the jubilee celebrations;
- and the now annual village litter pick.

Stuart grew up in the village and as a result probably knows as much about its people and history as anyone. As the village farmer Stuart is known to many as he tends his fields and many will appreciate what an excellent steward he is for the countryside and, as well as being a major stakeholder in it, he is a fine custodian of the village.

We residents have been fortunate to have such a good neighbour: not all farms are so sensitively managed and farming is far from a 9 to 5 job yet still Stuart has been able and willing to be a very active councillor and latterly chairman.

On occasion parish council meetings have involved topics that raise passions and Stuart has been a wise, calming influence when tempers have been high.

Despite him being responsible for getting me first to sit as a councillor and more latterly as clerk, I am proud to call Stuart a friend and I'm delighted that he intends to stay active around the village.

Did you knowthat Combs is the home of a unique variety of apple?

"Catherine" is a long keeping, late -flowering, cooking apple from the garden of the Live and Let Live PH. It keeps its shape well when cooked and is more sweet than acidic in flavour. It was sent to the National Fruit Collections in Kent in 1977, when the original tree was already believed by residents of Combs to be a century old. It is believed to be a seedling tree. That is, a tree that developed from an apple pip, either dropped accidentally by a bird or animal, or deliberately planted by someone in the past. Seedling trees from pips do not grow "true" to their parents, so we will never know what the parents of this tree were. It is a vigorous grower and crops heavily. Catherine was received at Brogdale in April 1977 from a man called Peter Cox. Catherine was never sold commercially until 2004 when EEAOP began propagating trees for sale for the first time. As far as we are aware the old original tree is no longer in the garden at the former pub.



The people of the village named it Catherine.

In December 2009, 17 Catherine apple trees were bought from The East of England Apples & Orchards Project and have been planted around the village.

On The Farm

Having looked back at what I wrote for the last newsletter and noting that rainfall was down on average, February turned out to be one of the driest on record with only 3.7 mm of rain recorded on the farm, but then we got to March and I recorded over 100 mm of rain. Mother nature can be so unpredictable. April has not faired much better with more rain and temperatures still low, what has happened to spring. Last year we were in a heat wave !!

The weather can have a big impact with everything that happens on the fields, so watching forecasts and having our own weather station to plan work is very important. Applications of inputs on the crops need certain weather conditions, whether applied to the ground "rain to make it work" or to the foliage then "no rain in 6 hours", some only need an hour.

Getting crops planted this spring has been much of a challenge with so many wet days. The spring barley was planted in the dry February, it then had so much rain it did not grow. This has since been re-drilled and has finally established. The peas had to wait for better weather and drier conditions so not to sit in cold wet soil. These were drilled 3 weeks later than normal and are growing well.

Work continues in the vineyard with all the 46,000 canes tied down onto the fruiting wire by the 3rd week in April. Our team have now started to go back through each vine selecting two shoots in the crown of the vine and removing the rest which become next years canes. The vines are looking good this year with good buds and growth. So far we have only had one night that the temperature got down to 0 degrees. Only a few buds have showed sign of damage. The new weather station in the vineyard is capable of predicting disease conditions, instead of spraying every 2 weeks to keep on top of disease we will now only spray when the disease pressure is predicted. We could do with the sun showing itself a bit more and some warmer temperatures please.

Next job will be to keep on top of the grass which seems to be growing rapidly at the moment with cutting of footpaths and tracks

Before you know it summer will be here.

Wattisham Flying Station Liaison

The Parish Council received an invitation to a liaison meeting at Wattisham Flying Station which, as many of you will know, hosts a section of the UK's attack helicopter force. After discussions it has been decided to keep the station operational until 2045. Some training and maintenance activities have been deployed and there are now only half the number of aircraft from a few years ago: I imagine residents will have noticed the reduction in flying activity.

The extension of the station's lifetime means that accommodation will need to be refurbished. Existing buildings will be replaced by a modular design and this means that there will be transportation of these large modules around and about the area. The roads of Combs are less likely to be affected than those of Ringshall and Wattisham and the overall impact will be less than a full scale rebuild. We'll endeavour to keep you informed as we will receive updates.

A note for your diaries: there will be a Flypast over Buckingham Palace on 17th June to celebrate the King's Birthday. Wattisham has been selected as the marshalling point for the entire helicopter contingent – so expect a sizeable force to be taking off in the morning to join up with the other aircraft taking part.

Our thanks to the Station for inviting us to a most interesting session.

Orchard Barn News

Architecture students from University College London recently

spent 5 days at Orchard Barn, learning about how to build with natural materials. The students, originally from Singapore, India and Australia, stayed at a B&B in Wattisham and were able to walk to Orchard Barn each day. They helped with our timber framed long house project, by mixing rich boulder clay dug from our neighbour's footings, with locally grown barley straw to make a light



straw clay. This was then packed between the oak timber frame and around the long house walls to form a natural and effective form of insulation. The students were very interested in sustainability and were also inspired by our off grid site – no mains water or electricity. It's great to think that future architects are taking natural and sustainable building methods seriously and are looking to incorporate this approach in their professional lives. We look forward to hosting more international students this Summer.
